THE INTERNATIONAL YEAR OF
RANGELANDS AND

As part of celebrations of International Year of Rangelands and Pastoralists, 2026 (IYRP), the Rangeland Restoration Awards was launched to recognize individuals, communities, and groups, organisations whose work - on the ground, field level activity, through policy, or advocacy - has advanced rangeland restoration and management anywhere in the world. Nominations opened on 1 April 2026 and closed 31 May 2026, drawing 90 entries submitted by applicants from 26 countries by themselves or by nominating institutions and agencies. A seven members steering committee, drawing on representatives from FAO, ILRI, and IYRP Regional Support Group experts, reviewed submissions against criteria including measurable impact on extend of land restored, livestock and livestock keepers benefitted, biodiversity outcomes, and the strength of the underlying practice, policy, or community action. Twenty awardees were selected globally, each has been provided with certificate of Achievement and award money on 18th Aug. 2026 at a side event of COP17 of UNCCD at Ulaanbaatar, Mongolia.

The cross section of best practices include :

Awareness and advocacy on bringing out lands for recording them in formal system or classification and retrieved from diversion for other purpose, exploring ongoing schemes converged with peoples participation on focussing on rangelands, local breeds for livelihood improvement, experimenting with low cost solutions for removal of encroachments by exotic species or private interests, youth continuing family profession of pastoralist life even after good education and finding out options to meet their modest income and secured life, application of good soil and water conservation practices and involving communities using local knowledge or innovations through motivation and overcoming constraints of funds, focussing on women and using their strength of participation for revival and management of resources with rules or regulations and strengthening their capacity with traditional wisdom, underlying the importance of new approaches, regulations and innovations through slogans which are much relevant viz. grass banks, 5 percent reduction of livestock for rangeland health, coexistence with wild life, virtual fencing, Responsible Nomads Code of Practice, summer enclosure- winter grazing, herder photography group, grass guards, rangeland doctor, nomadic schools, livestock operator to grassland stewards, traditional manuring system with digital tool, digital traceability for transparency, ban afforestation in migratory routes and local breeds for sustainable grazing.
